The Sermon

During the seasons of Advent and Christmas, instead of the Nicene Creed, we are joining our voices in the Affirmation of Faith from the Iona Community. Rooted in the language of justice, peace, and creation, this affirmation expresses the same ancient faith through contemporary words that call us to live what we believe. It reminds us that faith is not only something we confess but something we practice in the world.

We believe in God who is older than eternity and younger than our next breath; who is beyond describing yet knows us all by name; who inspires faith, yet cannot be contained by religion.

We believe in Jesus Christ, flesh of our flesh, bone of our bone; he came in the body to give worth to every human life. He touched the untouchable, loved the unlovable, and endured slander, persecution and death. But the third day he rose again, to continue his work through us, until the end of time.

We believe in the Holy Spirit of God, who longs within our souls for wholeness and peace, who weeps with the broken and weary, and empowers us for healing, reconciliation and hope.

We believe that God is with us, before us, behind us, above us and within us. We rejoice that nothing can ever separate us from the love of God, made known in Christ Jesus, our Lord.



Then the Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

This Sunday's Adult Forum: The Beautiful Contradictions of the Gospel Birth Narratives Johnson Hall December 28, 9:00-10:00

When we imagine "the Christmas story," we usually blend Matthew and Luke together into one seamless narrative. But the truth is that the New Testament gives us two very different birth stories—and when we place them side by side, the contradictions are striking.

This Sunday we'll explore why these differences are not mistakes to fix, but theological treasures. Each Gospel writer shapes the birth of Jesus in a way that speaks to the hopes, fears, and struggles of their particular community.

Matthew presents Jesus as the new Moses, fulfilling Israel's story.

Luke proclaims Jesus as Savior for the poor, the marginalized, and the whole world.

By looking closely at where the stories diverge—where the Holy Family lives, why they go to Bethlehem, who visits Jesus, how the genealogy works—we discover that the Gospels are not modern biographies but theological portraits. They invite us into meaning, not literal chronology.

Come learn why these contradictions are not problems to solve but windows into the depth, beauty, and mystery of the Incarnation—revealing a God who draws near in ways far richer than a single story could contain.
