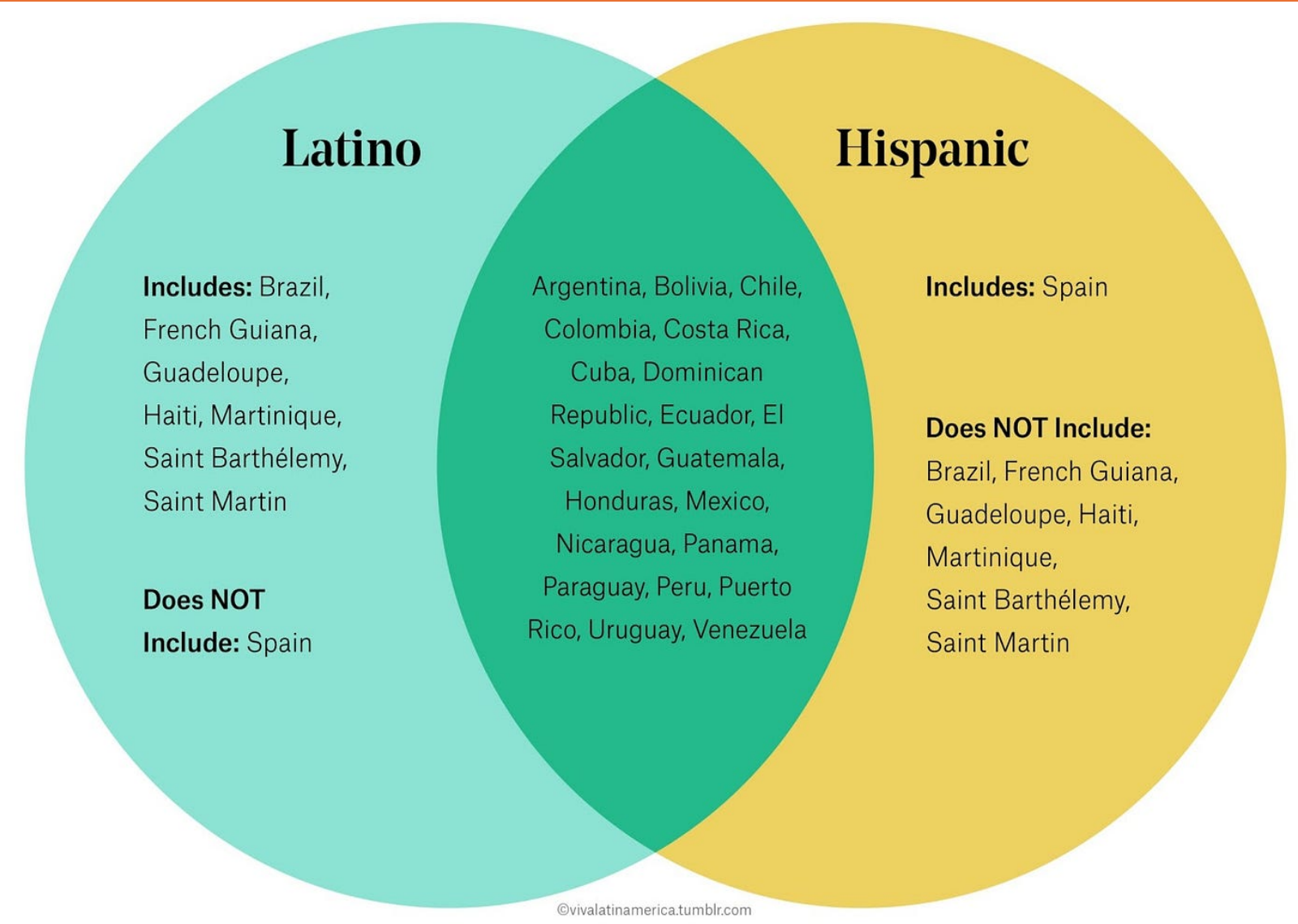




Mission

EMERGENCE OF WORD

The community's desire to be seen and counted

WHEN?

Around the 1970s

MEANING

People who are from or whose ancestry comes from Spanish-speaking countries

LATINO

EMERGENCE OF WORD

Encourages a sense of connection through a common history of colonization

WHEN?

1990s-2000s

MEANING

People who are from or whose ancestry comes from Latin America

LATINX

EMERGENCE OF WORD

Intended to be an LGBTQ+ inclusive version of Latino

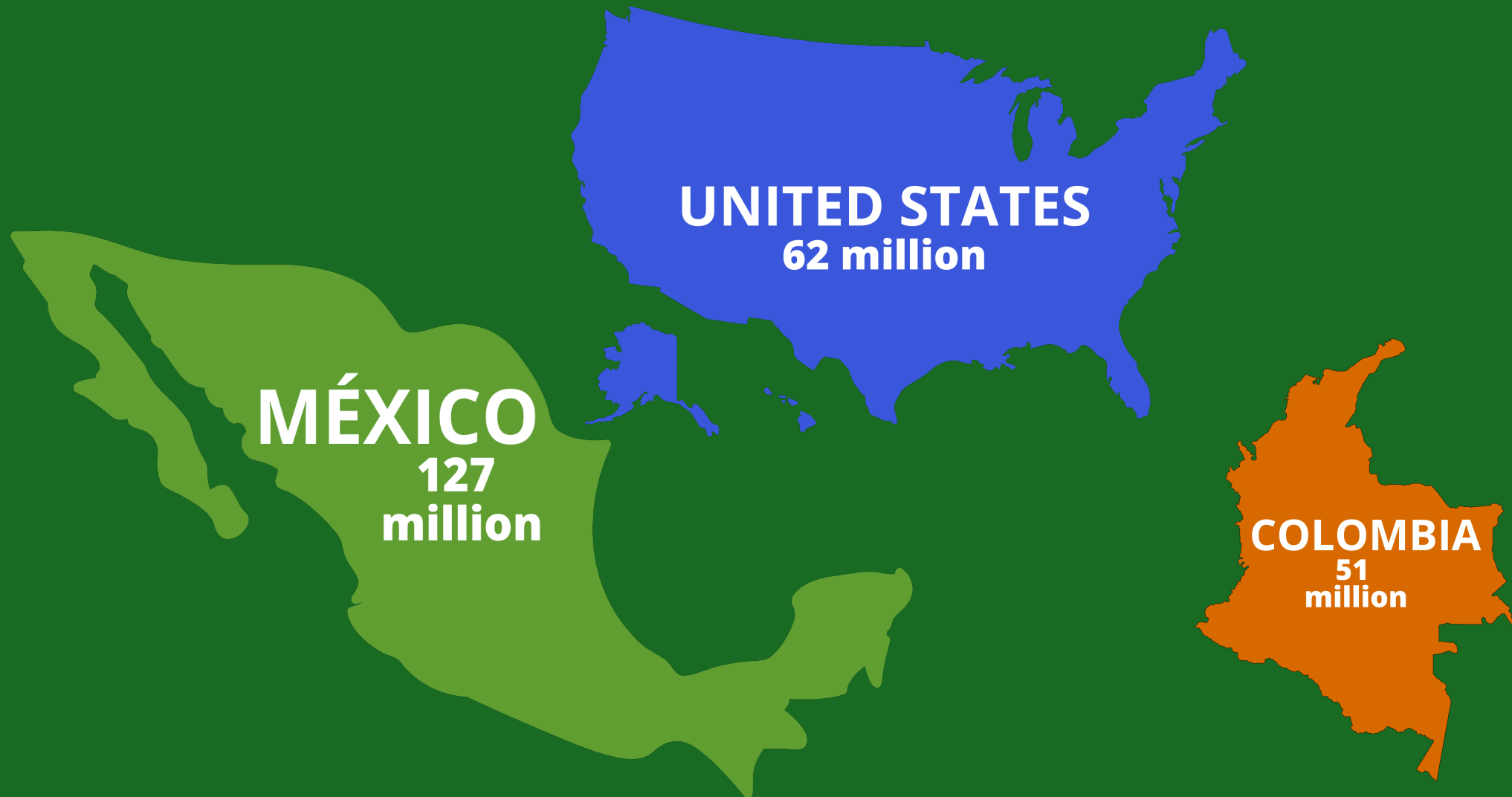
WHEN?

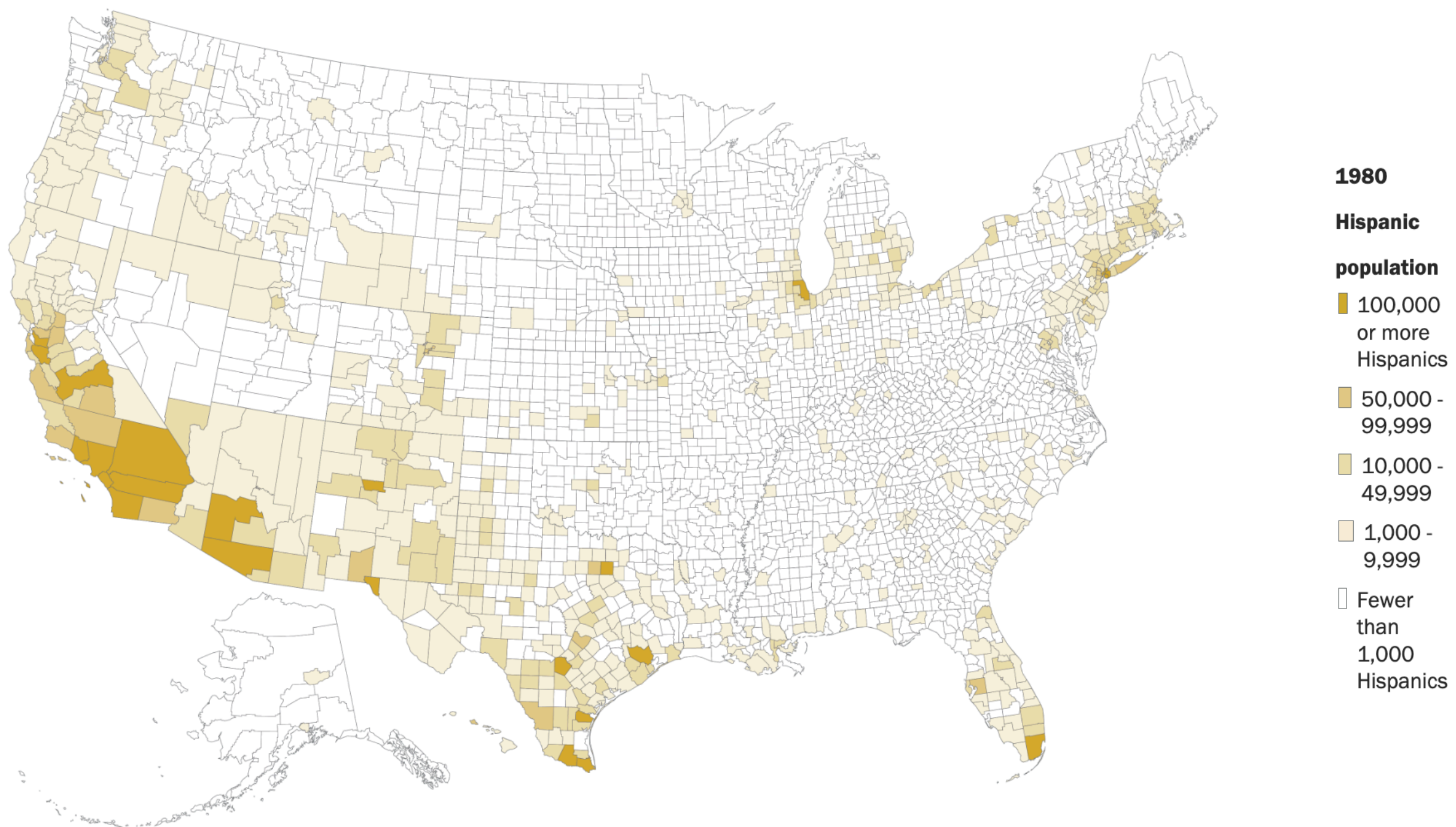
Late 1990s-2010s

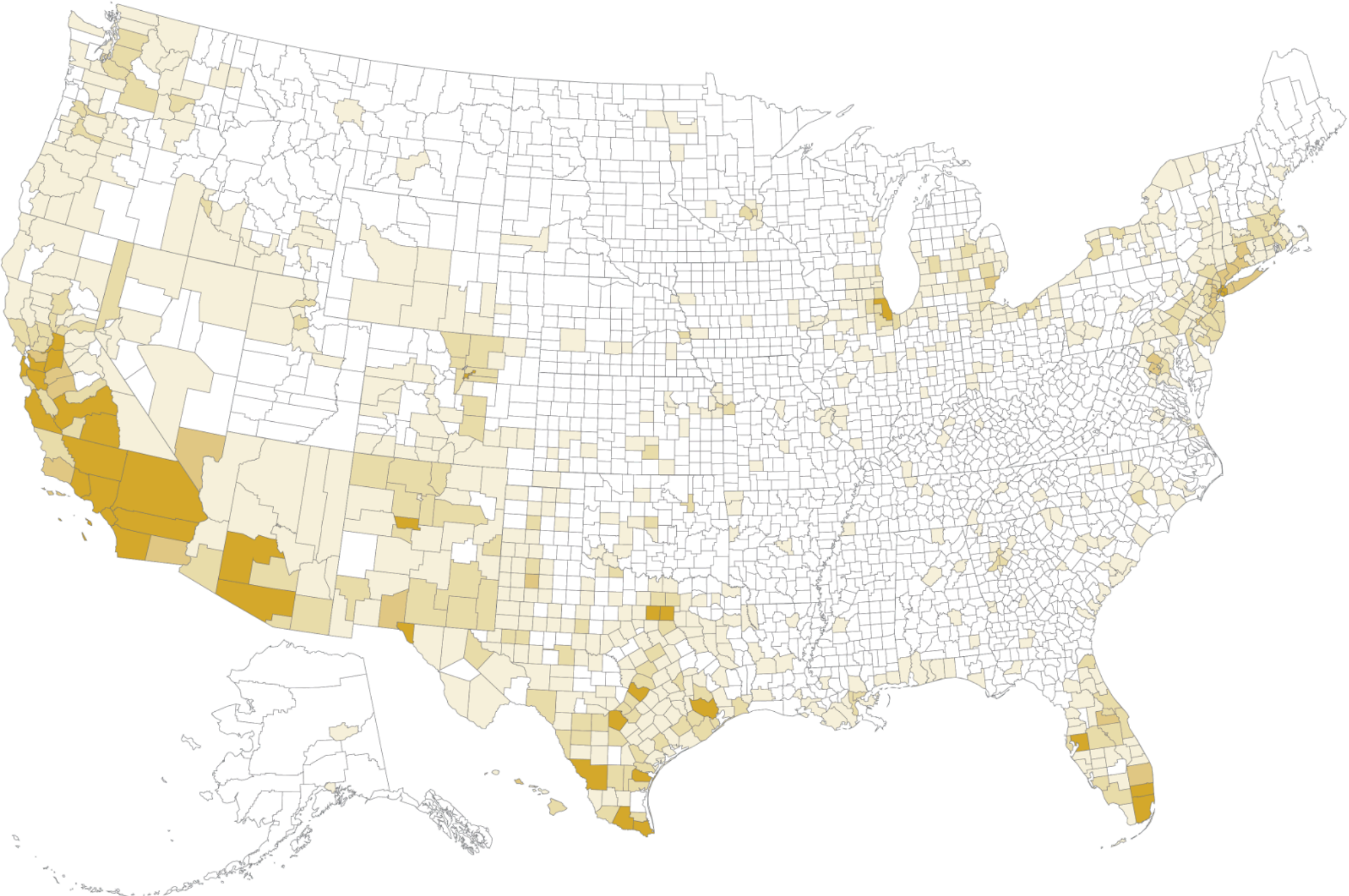

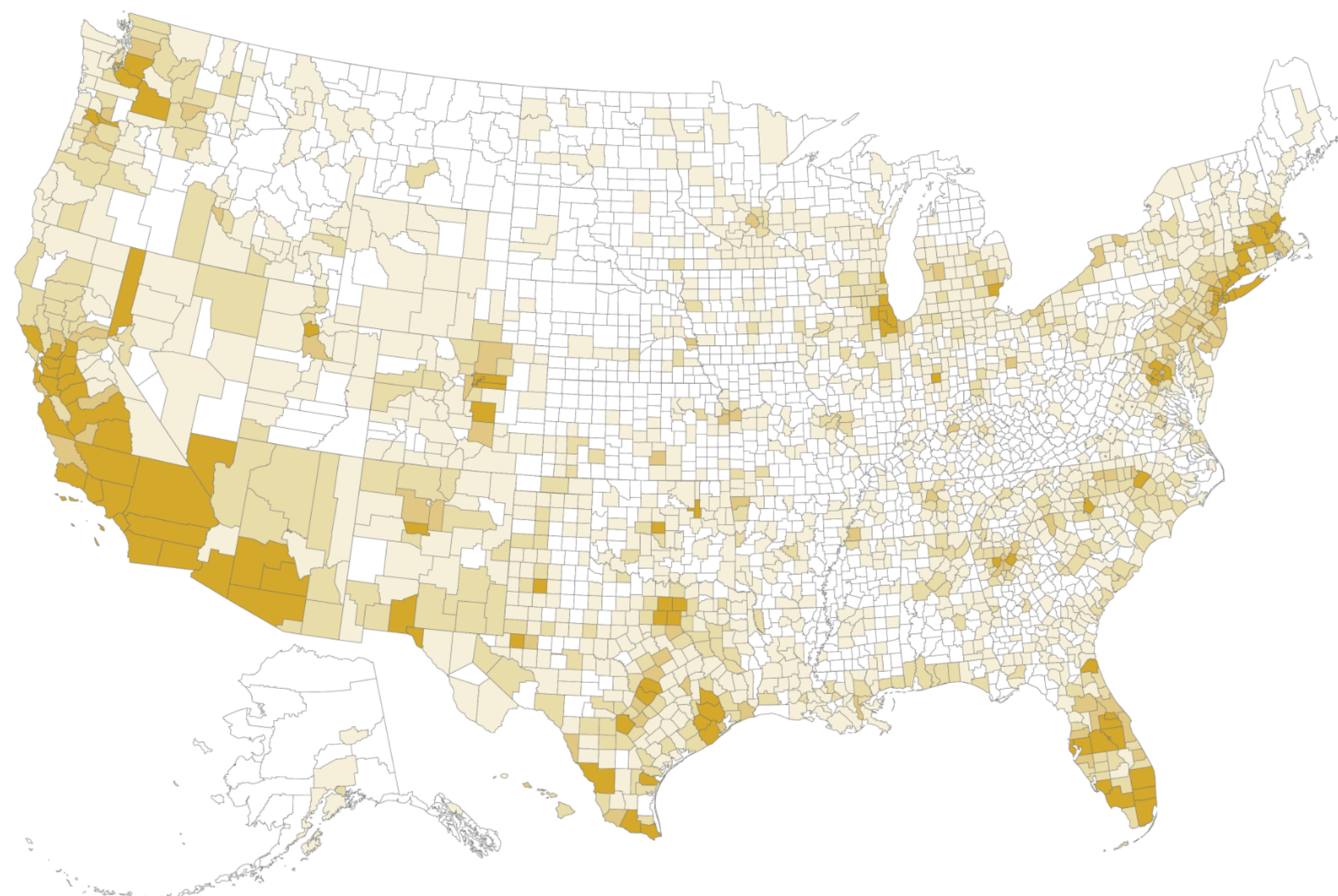

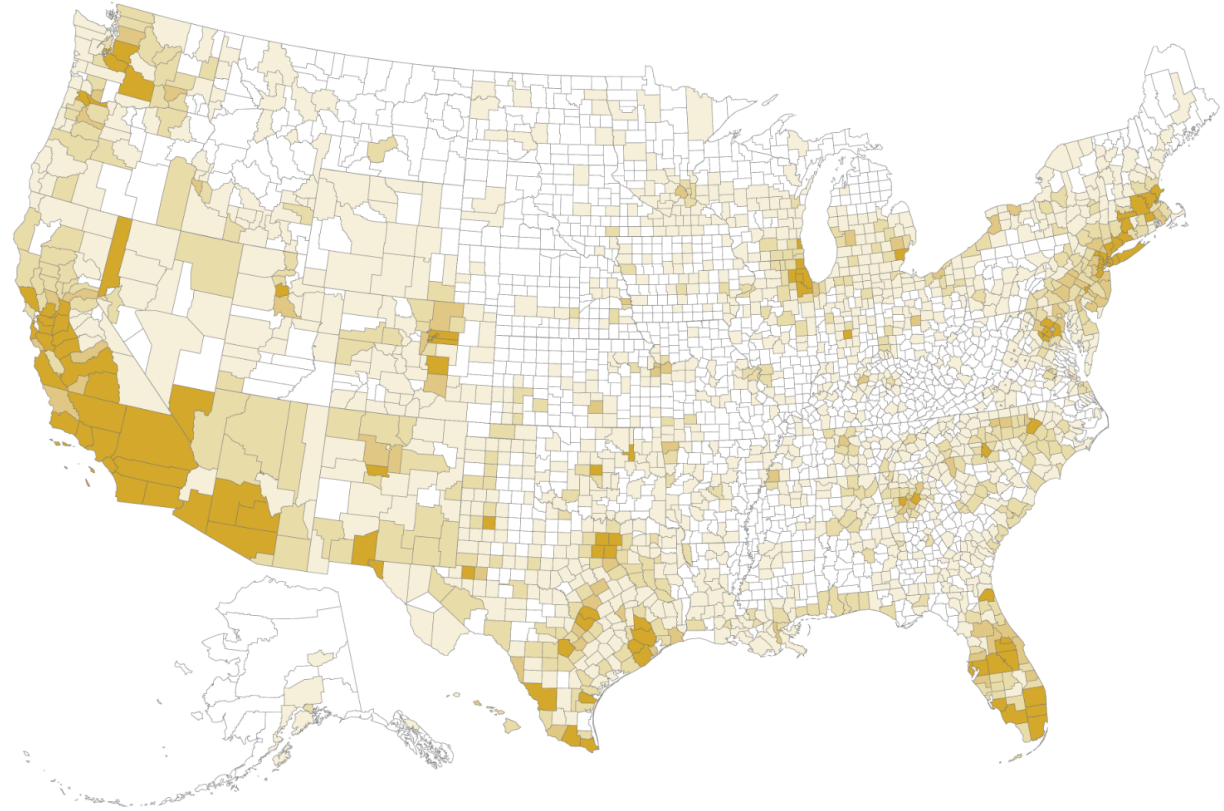

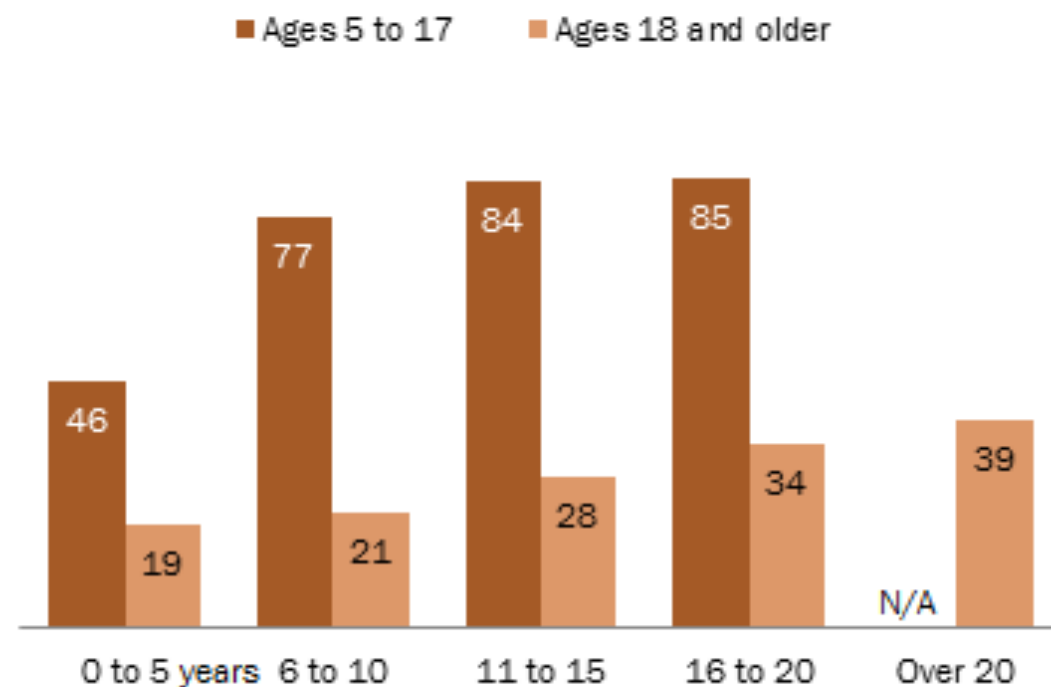
